BOARD PERSONNEL

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We have approximately 9,000 elementary and 3,000 students doing virtual online learning. Approximately 1,500 of these students have IEPs or receive Special Education services. Cohort C are online and cohort D are paper packages. Education Coordinators continue to service those students from their family of schools. They have already established good relationships with these students and families. Learning Support Teachers and Speech and Language Pathologists and Psychological Services Staff will be supporting the students in these cohorts as well as in-school learners. We will be meeting with the Learning Disabilities Asso(s)8.0.005hbl855ni

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these students as well. Teachers are supporting 225 minutes of online teaching and our support staff will join the teacher online to provide support. We also have the Boardmaker program which will help to develop structured activities that students can do right away. All staff are working extremely hard to make this virtual learning a successful experience.

We also received funding from the Ministry to run Camp Discovery. This camp had 56 students and 9 teachers. The focus was on the following:

- Support Mental Wellness
- Improved Mathematics Learning
- Support high-levels of engagement
- Support Parent Engagement
- Develop an understanding of technological literacy

Camp discovery was extremely successful and we will look at setting up a presentation for SEAC in the fall.

Empower will continue to run in our schools. We have training coming up for teachers new to Empower. It is very impactful for students who struggle with reading. We are looking at how it will be delivered virtually. The program will most likely start back up at the end of September.

M. Fuduric, Learning Disabilities Association Windsor/Essex – LDAWE has moved to the John McGivney Centre, located at XXXX Matchette Avenue, Windsor, ON. Some programs offered are: 1:1 Oline Tutoring for children with a learning disability from Grades 2 – 9. Grade 2& 3 receive 30 minutes one day per week and Grade 4 – 9 receive 60 minutes one day per week, and Reading Buddies which is a free 12-week program for children in Grades 1-6, for 30 minutes once per week.
